About the Authors

The **Tiffany Neighborhood's 2016 Needs Assessment and Action Plan** was completed in collaboration with the community stakeholders of the Tiffany neighborhood and Park Central Development Corporation, a not-for-profit 501(c)3 community development corporation, located in the Central Corridor of the City of St. Louis. The mission of Park Central Development Corporation is to strengthen and attract investment that creates and maintains vibrant neighborhoods and commercial districts.

The Tiffany Needs Assessment Committee (the "Committee") is a group of Tiffany residents who met between April 2016 and December 2016 on a monthly basis to discuss the needs in their neighborhood. The needs assessment process for this project was coordinated by the staff at Park Central Development.

Neighborhood Context

The **Tiffany neighborhood** is located on the western side of Grand Boulevard along the section containing SSM Health's St. Louis University Hospital and Cardinal Glennon Children's Hospital. The neighborhood is defined by Chouteau Avenue on the North, Interstate 44 on the South, Grand Boulevard on the East, and 39th Street on the West. The neighborhood is largely industrial north of Park Avenue and residential south of Park Avenue.

The Tiffany neighborhood was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in December of 1978 and consists of 215 contributing structures built between 1891 and 1928. The neighborhood building structures were designed by a combination of architects, owners and contractors who had a sense of neighborhood cohesion in mind during the planning phase. Buildings were built with high-quality brickwork and fine architectural details that included "picturesque features of the 1890s, classical turn-of-the-century ornament and



examples of the bungaloid mode"¹. The buildings uniformity in material, building line and density created a pleasing feel and look for the neighborhood.

In the center of the Tiffany neighborhood is Tiffany Park, a 1.10 acres city park that is maintained by the City of St. Louis Parks Division. Tiffany Park is bordered by McRee Avenue on the south, the alley between Folsom and Blaine to the north and S. Spring Avenue to the east. Tiffany Park amenities include a pavilion, picnic grounds, a playground, and a tiered concrete semi-circle with a water feature in the center. Adjacent to the park is the Tiffany Community Center, which is located on the first floor of 3811 Blaine Avenue building, with access to one large common room, two bathrooms and a kitchen. The Tiffany Community Center is used for monthly neighborhood association meetings and summer camp programming in the last few years.

Although the neighborhood currently has a largely renters population, there is a growing number of home sales in the neighborhood. [HOME SALES IN THE AREA] According to the 2010 U.S. Census, the population of the Tiffany neighborhood is approximately 1,086. The racial breakdown of the neighborhood consists of 84% African-American, 11% Caucasian, 2% Asian, 2% Hispanic and 1% other. There are a total of 531 housing units, 449 units which are occupied (85% occupancy rate) and 82 units which are vacant (15% vacancy rate).


How This Plan Was Created

Park Central Development staff led the efforts to create a committee of community stakeholders in the Tiffany neighborhood to assist in the completion of a needs assessment. The needs assessment looks at what residents liked and did not like about their neighborhood, as well as the gaps in services that still existed in the neighborhood. Working closely with the Tiffany Community Association and Ward 19 Alderwoman Marlene Davis, a committee of 10 community stakeholders was recruited and began to meet on a monthly basis starting May 2016.

The Tiffany Needs Assessment Committee (the "Committee") were tasked to: (1) Understand the current assets and demographic makeup of the neighborhood; (2) Identify the needs and gaps in services that currently exist; and (3) To create a 5-Year Action Plan that will specifically identify the service needs and the resources needed to implement the service projects.

During the community input and feedback phase, a Tiffany Needs Survey (the "survey") was created to distribute to the community to gather demographic data and service needs. Committee members distributed and collected surveys at several community-wide events and went door-to-door to a large majority of the neighborhood to ensure residents were aware of the survey and could complete them on the spot. Self-stamped envelopes were left at the doorstep of a hundred household to be return to the Tiffany Community Center (at the address of "3811 Blaine Avenue, St. Louis, MO 63110") and an online link was made available to residents to complete the survey online.

A total of a hundred and six (106) surveys were completed by residents of the Tiffany neighborhood during the time frame of June 25th – September 4th, 2016.



Who is Park Central Development?

Park Central Development Corporation is a not-for-profit 501(c)3 community development corporation located in the Central Corridor of the City of St. Louis. The mission of Park Central Development Corporation is to strengthen and attract investment that creates and maintains vibrant neighborhoods and commercial districts.

Park Central Development does this by:

- Conducting assessments of needed services, amenities & infrastructure enhancements;
- Implementing committees specific to neighborhood needs such as, Development Review,
 Public Infrastructure, Social and Human Services, Safety/Block Captains/NOM, Marketing and
 Special Events;
- Leveraging resources for public infrastructure improvements;
- Creating a unique identity for each neighborhood & commercial district;
- Installing public art;
- Implementing new zoning codes;
- Coordinating Special Events;
- Implementing & administering special taxing districts;
- Creating & managing business association;
- Recruiting and helping place developers, businesses and residents.



Park Central's Service Area

A large majority of Park Central's work is focus in their service area, which includes seven different neighborhoods, in the central corridor of St Louis City.

Through an institutional partnership with SSM Health/SLU Hospital, Park Central's staff begin working with the Tiffany community as early as March 2016 to assess for the needs and gaps in services that still existed in the neighborhood.

Survey Process

To gather demographic data and residents' opinions on their neighborhood, a Tiffany Needs Survey (the "survey") was created to distribute to the community. The survey contained fiftyeight (58) questions and included questions on what residents liked about the neighborhood, concerns the residents may have about in the neighborhood, and general demographic questions like household income and household size. Residents were also given the opportunity to share what they would like to see happen in their neighborhood and their interest in joining future implementation committees for project needs that are derived from this needs assessment.



During the community engagement and feedback phase of this project, Committee members distributed and collected complete surveys at three (3) community-wide events, conducted two (2) door-to-door surveying days, and distributed a hundred (100) surveys to be mail in by residents with self-stamped envelopes. Public announcements of the survey availability online and in-person were also made during the July 19th and August 16th Tiffany Community Association neighborhood meetings and through their monthly newsletters.

Community-wide events and community engagement activities where the surveys were made available to residents included:



- ❖ August 6th 2016 Tiffany's Summer Night Out at Tiffany Park
- ❖ August 16th 2016 Tiffany Community Association's meeting at Tiffany Community Center
- ❖ August 27th 2016 Door-to-door surveying efforts; Focused on 10XX Spring, 38XX Folsom, 38XX Park, 38XX 39th and 38XX Lafayette
- ❖ September 3rd 2016 Community of Hope Festival at Tiffany Park
- ❖ September 3rd 2016 Door-to-door surveying efforts; Focused on 36XX McRee, 36XX Lafayette

A total of a hundred and six (106) Tiffany Needs Surveys was completed by residents in the Tiffany neighborhood during the timeframe of June 25th – September 3rd, 2016.

The Tiffany Neighborhood Needs Survey was distributed between the period of June 25th and September 3rd 2016. The survey was available both in paper and online form for residents to complete. Through the efforts of the Tiffany Needs Committee, Tiffany residents and Park Central staff, the survey was distributed at three community-wide events at Tiffany Park (Ice Cream Social, Tiffany's Summer Night Out and Tiffany's Community of Hope) and door-to-door efforts was conducted to at least 100 households in the neighborhood.

Self-reported demographic information from survey respondents




According to US Census 2010 data, the Tiffany neighborhood has a population size of 1,086, with 86% identifying as Black, 11% identifying as White, and 2.3% identifying as Asian. In terms of age, 70% of the population is over the age of 18 and 30% of the population is under the age of 17.

For this Tiffany survey, the targeted population was adults age 18 and over. The large majority of respondents - 98% - were self-identified in the age category of 19 and above.




























Neighborhood Assets

During the *Visioning Process session* with the Tiffany Needs Committee on May 17th 2016, the residents on the committee listed the things they liked about their neighborhood.

The strengths and assets include:

- People: Alderwoman, diverse, good neighbors, longterm residents, lots of family, friendly, knowledgeable neighbors
- Government: An active alderwoman, Neighborhood Improvement Specialist, and Circuit Attorney representative
- *Environment:* Tiffany Park, trees, green space, gates that surrounds the neighborhood, a water tower, attractive housing stock (architecture)
- Institutional: Cardinal Glennon, City Garden, SLISS, SLU
- Economy: some business, in the middle of booming neighborhoods, Cortex/South Grand
- Human Services: Daycare, hospital, central location, home repairs by Habitat for Humanity and Mission STL
- *Transportation:* major bus lines, highways, adequate parking

According to the survey, residents expressed what they liked most about the Tiffany were:

- *Great location* that is accessible to public transportation, medical facilities and job opportunities
- Affordable and attractive architecture that is historic and family-friendly
- Tiffany Park and green space that is accessible and centralized in the neighborhood





Neighborhood Needs

CHILDREN NEEDS

There are many families with children in the neighborhood. Many residents have expressed the need for their children to be more involved and engaged in activities that bring the community together. Academic achievement among school-aged children is an ongoing concern for residents in the neighborhood. According to neighborhood survey, 47% of the children who reside in the neighborhood are not involved or enrolled in any afterschool programming. More than half the population of children surveyed in the neighborhood are in the free/reduced lunch program at school, suggesting that extracurricular programs need to be affordable for families in the neighborhood to participate in.

Specifically, services that can benefit the needs of children in the neighborhood are:

- Academic tutoring and programming
- Sports and other physical activities
- Social and recreational activities



ADULT NEEDS

There is a diversity in age and socioeconomic status in the neighborhood. There is a wide range of residents with varying degrees, ranging from high school diplomas to professional degrees. Many residents have expressed the need for more community events that would bring neighbors together.

Specifically, services that can benefit the 18 years old and older are:

- Activities that promote healthier lifestyle
- Money management
- Job training and access to employment opportunities

COMMUNITY-WIDE NEEDS

Aside from the human services needs in the community, public infrastructure (i.e., streets, alleys, lighting) and safety needs are still a concern for the neighborhood. Given the historic nature of the neighborhood, there are many buildings which are in need of maintenance.

Specifically, the activities that are still a concern for the neighborhood include:

- Speeding along the main streets of the neighborhood Lafayette, Spring and 39th Avenue
- Concern on crime and safety include illegal dumping, burglary and loitering
- ❖ Poor maintenance of buildings and the decline of neighborhood architecture

Committees to Implement Future Neighborhood Projects

COMMITTEE 1: Development Review and Public Infrastructure

Objective of the Committee:

- To ensure development activities happening in and/or near the neighborhood are congruent to the needs and vision of the neighborhood.
- To ensure development activities will do no harm and benefit residents and businesses.
- To preserve and maintain the historic nature of the neighborhood architecture.
- To improve the aesthetic and infrastructure of the neighborhood's public spaces.

Committee Tasks:

- Meet on a monthly basis (or as needed) on development activities.
- Review development proposals and discuss projects' recommendations.
- Review and assess for public infrastructure needs in the neighborhood and advocate for funds to complete projects.
- Identify and manage projects that will beautify and brand the neighborhood to residents and visitors (i.e., neighborhood banners, iron gates, etc.)

COMMITTEE 2: Social and Human Services

Objective of the Committee:

- To coordinate social services activities that will address the needs of both children and adults in the neighborhood.
- To assist in the identification of funding opportunities available for social services needs in the neighborhood.

Committee Tasks:

- Meet on a monthly basis to coordinate activities and services.
- Review and assess for social services needs in the neighborhood and advocate for funds to complete projects.
- Coordinate social services activities to address specific needs for the Tiffany community.
- Coordinate summer programming activities for the Tiffany Community Center and Tiffany Park.

COMMITTEE 3: Special Events and Safety Activities

Objective of the Committee:

- To improve community relations among residents through community events.
- To improve safety and security in the neighborhood through awareness and programming.

Committee Tasks:

- Meet on a monthly basis to coordinate safety initiatives and events.
- Maintain communication among committee members on safety concerns in the neighborhood.
- Coordinate a minimum of two community events each year to bring residents and neighbors together.
